## Supporting Prostate Health in the Black Community

Happy Thursday, Mount Sinai Community,

In the United States, prostate cancer is the second-most-common form of cancer in men, behind only skin cancer. About one in eight U.S. men will develop prostate cancer at some point in their lives, and one in 40 will die of prostate cancer.

For Black men, the risk is even higher. Research indicates that Black men are 70 percent more likely to develop high-risk prostate cancer than white men. Surprisingly, Black men are more than twice as likely to die of the disease.

At Mount Sinai, we are not accepting this disparity—we are addressing it, by improving access to screenings and treatment for Black men in New York. Earlier this month, our Milton and Carroll Petrie Department of Urology launched the Mount Sinai Robert F. Smith Mobile Prostate Cancer Screening Unit, with the help of One Hundred Black Men, to support prostate health and to address the disproportionately high incidence of prostate cancer in the Black community.

Mount Sinai's mobile unit, made possible by a generous donation from Vista Equity CEO and philanthropist Robert F. Smith based on the vision of Ash Tewari. MBBS, MCh, Chair of Urology for the Mount Sinai Health System, brings state-of-the-art imaging equipment and specialized staff directly to the communities that need them most. Early detection and diagnosis are the best ways to maintain good prostate health, and with this mobile unit, Mount Sinai is raising awareness of the disparities Black men face and increasing access to care.
